
Trees for Reducing Energy Usage

Trees have the ability to reduce energy usage.

Deciduous trees shade in the summer and allow warming sunlight through in the winter. Deciduous trees growing on the east and west side of a house shade it in the hot summer days, reducing the need for air conditioning. Providing shade to an air conditioner can increase its efficiency by 10%. Shading areas that are “heat sinks” such as driveways, sidewalks, and dark asphalt shingle roofs can also improve comfort and reduce energy use. Solar energy is welcome in the winter and readily passes through the bare crown of deciduous trees to help heat houses then, reducing the amount of electricity, gas, or oil needed to heat your house. So no matter what the season, give your tree a hug and thank it for helping to keep you and your house comfortable. Then, give it a buddy.

When considering adding a tree or shrub to your landscape, ensure you chose the best plant for the site by considering purpose of the planting, space available (horizontally and vertically), and soil type before choosing the plant. Considering all of the information you gathered, consult with an arborist or the “Tree Guide” at www.arboday.org to select a species. Finally, call Miss Utility at 811 before you dig your planting hole. ■

For the first time in the event’s history, local beer will be served at the bar tent. Old Busthead Brewery has agreed to participate in the event as have several local wineries. At 8:00 PM the restaurants will begin serving from their stations and the acoustic music will give way to the grooving tunes of the rockabilly band The Bopcats, who will play for the duration of the event, inspiring the crowd to get out onto the dance floor.

Although the event winds down at 11:00 PM, guests who wish to continue the celebration can make their way to Sibby’s Restaurant and Lounge on 2nd Street for the after-party. Sibby’s will have live musical entertainment and a limited menu available until 1:00 AM.

Evening Under the Stars continues to provide the community with a stellar opportunity to dress to the nines and enjoy a night under the stars surrounded by the beautiful backdrop of Old Town Warrenton. The dress code is black tie optional; business casual required.

Recycling In Warrenton

It's a breeze to recycle in Warrenton, and something everyone is encouraged to do. The Town has three separate curbside recycling programs covering most materials that we throw out every day. Each item is picked up by a different truck and then hauled to recycling centers for processing.

All recyclables are collected on Wednesdays, and should be placed out at your curb by 8:00 AM that day.

Here is a snapshot of what recyclables Town crews will take away for you:

Cardboard Program *(for corrugated cardboard)*

Corrugated cardboard is that brown box material consisting of thin layers of cardboard surrounding a ribbed section of cardboard. To recycle corrugated cardboard, remove all packing materials (newspaper, Styrofoam, peanuts, shredded paper, wood pieces, etc.), and then break down your boxes by slitting the packaging tape and flattening them. Then stack your boxes inside another box and put them out for pick up. Please remember that this collection is for corrugated cardboard only. Boxes made out of gray fiberboard (like cereal and cake mix boxes, and soda cartons, does not go in this collection).

Newspaper Program

This program collects all newspapers as well as magazines and phone books. Tie yours up in a bundle with string, or place them into a paper bag (not plastic!), then place them out on recycling day.

Recycling Bag Program

(The Town-supplied blue or clear bag with the recycling emblem)

This program is for glass, plastic, steel and aluminum. All of it can be placed together into the bags and placed out on recycling day. But, please be careful to place into the bags only items that are clearly recyclable. Here are some guidelines:

GLASS - Only glass bottles and jars. No window or picture glass please.

PLASTIC - Plastic bottles, bowls, cups, plates, containers, etc. that are imprinted with either the number one (1) or the number (2). These numbers are normally found on the bottom of the item surrounded by a triangular recycling symbol. Most milk jugs, soft drink bottles and laundry soap containers fall into this category. Once you've been a recycler for a little while, you'll get good at judging what type of plastic you have without even looking at the number.



STEEL AND ALUMINUM – Only steel, aluminum and tin food and beverage containers. Most food cans (pet food too), soft drink and beer cans fall into this category. Please remove all lids and tops, rinse them, crush them whenever possible, and put them into your recycling bag.

Here are some items to avoid in your recycling bags:

- * Styrofoam
- * Aerosol cans
- * Plastic grocery bags
- * Fiberboard and paper



The Town would like to thank all of the residents that are already participating in the recycling program, and encourage those who aren't to give it a try. It's not hard to do, and you'll be surprised to see how much waste material can be used again.

Brush Collection Policy Review

The Town's regular Brush Collection is for larger limbs – the longer the better – and up to 8" or 9" in diameter. This collection is for Warrenton residents only, not businesses.

There is no schedule for the brush collection; this is a service that is done as time allows. Town residents should place their brush to the road-edge and lay it all in one direction. This makes it much safer, easier and quicker, if it's not just thrown in a pile and tangled up. Once you have placed it to the curbside, call the Public Works Office and be placed on the "Brush List" to insure that your brush gets picked up.

All small limbs, twigs, vines, etc. should be placed in bags and set out with regular household refuse. Limbs that are too small for the chipper yet too big to place in bags can be bundled and tied up with string and set out with your regular refuse. Large logs, stumps, rocks and dirt will not be picked up. Also, if you hire a contractor or a landscaping company to do tree trimming, it's their responsibility to haul the trimmings and brush away. The Town will not pick it up if a contractor cuts it.





NOTE: There will be a refuse truck available at the Public Works Facility (360 Falmouth Street) during the holidays for anyone wishing to dispose of any excess trash. ■

Fall Leaf Collections Scheduled

The Town's annual leaf collections have been scheduled for November 3 – 14 and December 1 – 12. Here's your chance to dispose of all your fall leaves in an environmentally friendly manner, as the Town turns the leaves into organic mulch.

All property owners are requested to rake leaves to the street line by 8:00 AM on their first scheduled pick-up day. Please don't rake leaves into ditch lines or gutters as this causes clogging, and try to locate leaves so that vehicles are not blocking them. Town trucks will come down your street and vacuum up the leaves. To prevent damage to the equipment and injury to Town personnel, please don't put brush, limbs, rocks or other debris with your leaves.

To find out what days Town crews will be in your area, see the schedule below and refer to the Area Map on page 7, or you can check the town's web site at warrentonva.gov under "Fall Leaf Collection." You may also call the Public Works Department at (540) 347-1858.

After completion of the second collection there will be limited collection up through January 9th, after which any remaining leaves will have to be bagged and set out with household refuse.

Fall Clean-Up Week

Fall Clean-Up Week for the Town of Warrenton is scheduled for October 20 – 24. Town trucks will provide extra collections to pick up trash, refuse and other items that can't be handled on the regular weekly refuse schedule. All items should be placed on the street line by 8:00 AM on the day scheduled for your area. All trash and refuse must be placed in proper containers. Tree trimmings and brush must be placed separately. Small clippings from bushes or shrubs should be bagged and placed with regular refuse. Town crews will not pick up tree trimmings and brush cut by tree companies or contractors; that's the responsibility of the company doing the work. All metal must be separated from wood and placed separately. Dirt, rocks, sod, stumps and large logs will not be picked up.

The Town does pick up Freon appliances (air conditioning units, humidifiers/de-humidifiers, refrigerators, freezers, etc.). A local recycling company takes the items and drains the Freon at no cost. If you place a refrigerator or freezer out for pickup, the door must be removed.

Also for this collection Town crews will pick up tires, but there is a fee. To have tires picked up (with or without rims) you must pay \$3 per tire in advance. This is the amount the county landfill charges. Call Public Works in advance to make arrangements. If the fee is not paid in advance or no arrangements have been made the tires won't be picked up. To make arrangements, or if you have questions, call Public Works at (540) 347-1858.

Changes to Clean-Up Week

Beginning with this Fall Clean-up, Town crews will no longer pick up mattresses or box springs. The Landfill is now charging for disposing of these items.

Also, the Town does not pick up TVs, computer monitors, printers, copiers, fax machines, battery packs or any type of liquid, chemicals or paint. These items must be recycled at the landfill and there are fees to dispose of them. For more information on cost, or when you can take any of these items to the landfill, call the Fauquier County Waste Management Office at (540) 422-8840. If any of these items are set out during Clean-Up Week, they won't be picked up. If you have paint cans that are empty or dried up, remove the lid and Town crews will collect them.


